Dear Friends,

In our first few Sundays together at Ness Bank, we read the short Book of Ruth from the history pages of the Old Testament. It is the story of an outsider finding a home. **Emotionally** challenging, Ruth had to make a number of brave decisions - to come to Israel, to go out to the fields, to meet with Boaz. But practically rewarding - she gains a home and a family. Some of that reflects the experience Elspeth and I have had over the last few weeks, moving to a new city, home and church. It has not all been easy, but we are starting to feel at home.



But the story of Ruth is not just about the outsider coming in. It also describes the wanderer returning. Naomi left Israel many years earlier with her husband and two sons, but now all of them have died. Her bright future has disappeared, and she feels the need to return to the land of her birth and the God of her youth. Sometimes hard things make us turn away from God – "How can he allow this to happen?" But sometimes they make us turn back – "I can't do without him".

Perhaps some of us need to make that return journey? We could be newsletter readers who have stopped attending the services. Or viewers online now out of the habit. Or people who attend out of a sense of duty, but no longer in expectation. Or people who spectate rather than participate.

On her return, Naomi makes two great discoveries. First, there is no criticism. No questions are asked, no blessings are withheld. Old friends are pleased to see her back and are willing to help. Second, she can bring her new friend with her. She doesn't need to leave Ruth behind in order to return, and she shares in all the blessings Ruth receives.

In short, she re-discovers that God is good!

I hope and pray at the start of my Ness Bank ministry that we can make that rediscovery together. There will be lessons to learn, habits to form, questions to ask, perhaps changes to contemplate, and hopefully a steady stream of guests to welcome and new friends to make. Emotionally challenging, but practically rewarding – as Peter reflected towards the end of his lifetime of discipleship:

Let us give thanks to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ!

Because of his great mercy he has given us new life by raising Jesus from death.

This fills us with a living hope, and so we look forward to possessing the rich blessings that God keeps for his people...

for you, who through faith are kept safe by God's power.

(1st Peter 1.3-5)



Induction of Rev Stuart Smith

If you would like to donate, but not fill a box with all that's requested (or like buying multiples of only a few items), that is fine. Just pop your donation into a carrier bag and hand that into the vestibule instead. If you're a knitter, they happily accept knitted hats/scarves/gloves, so get your needles out if you would like to donate that way.

You can start shopping now but the essentials they ask to go into every box are, toothbrush and toothpaste, hat and scarf and gloves, soap, underwear/socks/tights, sweets and either a small toy for children or a wee gift for adults. Familiar Faces in Ness Bank - This Month's Spotlight is on:

Katia McFarlane

How did a Brazilian end up living in Inverness and being part of the Ness Bank congregation? This is how it came to pass.

I was born in Curitiba, the capital of the state of Paraná in the south of Brazil. This part of Brazil became home to immigrants from several countries in Europe after WW2. My grandfather arrived from Germany in 1929. My family are mainly from German descent and I was brought up listening to my grandparents and my father speaking German at home. From a young age I acquired a taste for drawing and painting from my grandfather who was a painter.



My father is an army officer, now retired, and my mother was a PE teacher. I have an elder sister who currently lives in Ely, and a younger brother and sister who live in Curitiba. Due to my father being in the army, we moved around a lot when I was young, spending time in different places including the US and Manaus, in the centre of the Amazon region.

I first learnt English when we lived in Vicksburg, Mississippi, for two years in the 70's. My dad made sure we kept studying English when we returned to Brazil so we wouldn't forget it. Later I chose English language and literature as my main subjects at university. I graduated in 1984 and worked as an EFL (English as a Foreign Language) teacher for 25 years. The first language school I worked for was a British-English Cultural franchise and I learnt a lot about people and life in the UK by teaching pupils of all ages from 7-year-olds to adults. My first trip to Scotland was in 1993, when I visited Glasgow and Edinburgh. Little did I know Scotland would be home years later.

I met people from several countries and made many friends either through work or the local amateur English-speaking theatre of Curitiba, which I was involved in for

many years. I was very lucky to be asked to help backstage when the Royal Shakespeare Company performed 'Henry VI' in 1995 in the local theatre.

My life changed completely after I met my husband-to-be, Stewart McFarlane, in 2001. At the time he was a British company's South American manager based in its manufacturing facility in Curitiba. We were married in Inverness in 2004. We did a lot of travelling to the UK, partly due to Stewart's job, and decided we needed a base so we bought a house in Scorguie, Inverness. We would spend Christmas there so the house was rented most of the time. Our main residence was still in Brazil.

However, when Stewart retired in 2009 we returned to the UK and settled in Inverness. We kept our apartment in Curitiba, which we return to twice a year for six to eight weeks at a time. Thus, this keeps me in touch with my family and friends. As a permanent resident in the UK, I had to sit a driving test and start the process of acquiring a British passport and citizenship. That involved several interviews and sitting a 'Life in the UK' test.

I was honoured to become a British citizen and thus have dual nationality. The ceremony took place in Inverness Town House in April 2011. Inverness received me with open arms and I gradually made some amazing friends. I joined dancing classes at Eden Court and also became a member of Nairn Camera Club. In the summer we enjoy walking and cycling. I have other hobbies which are sewing, painting, learning new handicrafts and learning languages.

Stewart and I were introduced to Ness Bank Church in 2010 by neighbours in Scorguie and joined the congregation. We moved to Croy in 2013 but kept coming to Ness Bank where we had many friends and felt at home with the congregation. We enjoyed being part of the Welcome Teams, which I cannot do now as I am part of the Audio-visual Team. This involves preparing PowerPoint presentations and livestreaming the Sunday services. It's amazing how technology brings people and the church together by enabling people to join the services remotely. It also enables us to follow the church services when we are in Brazil.

- 2. Ensure that the team fulfils its roles which are:
 - a) Review the financial information provided by the accountants
 - b) Prepare annual budgets for each category of expenditure
 - c) Ensure that the team performs duty of care and acts in good faith with church funds and legal and financial obligations of the church are being met
 - d) Ensure the team approves any exceptional costs that may arise outwith the budget
 - e) Ensure gift aid is controlled
 - f) Be updated by the finance administrator on any issues within their role
 - g) Liaise with ancillary organisations and provide the accountants with their financial expenditure and income
- 3. Report on the finances at Team Leaders meetings and to the Kirk Session as required

Anyone interested should inform the Session Clerk or a member of the Finance Team.

What if the stories read to babies and young children at these crucial moments were stories from the Bible: stories that told children they were safe and loved by a God who made them, and who will always be with them as they learn and grow.

How it works:

Once a child has been signed up, they'll receive the **Share a Story Bible** on their **1st** birthday.

On their **2nd**, **3rd** and **4th** birthdays they'll receive **birthday cards** and **fun resources** to encourage the whole family to keep engaging with the Bible.

On their **5th** birthday, they'll be given a **children's Bible** to start to read themselves and to explore with the adults in the family.

The Good Shepherd

Psalm 23 is well loved, and its paraphrased words are often sung in the popular hymn '*The Lord's My Shepherd*'. At the time of Jesus, these labourers were everywhere, as sheep were a common commodity. So when Jesus described a shepherd, He was referring to someone the people all knew about.

Our Lord's description of a shepherd helped His hearers to understand Jesus, as they were aware that sheep were valuable. A good shepherd made sure sheep were protected and fed. If they got into danger, they had to be rescued. A hireling would not be so considerate. He would abandon the sheep when faced with dangerous animals or aggressive thieves! Only a good shepherd would risk his life in caring for the flock.

In His parable (John 10:1-18) Jesus goes a step further talking about a good shepherd as He is speaking about Himself. Sheep know their owner and follow him, and Jesus wants us to know and follow Him. Sheep can get lost and end up in trouble. Jesus came to our rescue and is indeed our Saviour. A shepherd knows each sheep by name and Jesus knows *us* individually too. We can trust Him with our lives.

Jesus said that just as a shepherd is willing to die caring for his sheep, He too would die – looking ahead to His crucifixion. This would secure our salvation and provide a home with Him. Jesus also said that there are other sheep of interest to Him! He speaks of being the shepherd of all nations, not just the Jews. His love extends to everyone. These words of Jesus are so important. Give thanks that Jesus died for us and now awaits for us to be with Him. We belong to Him, we are His people, we are His flock.

Ness Bank Audio-Visual System

By the time you read this article you may already have seen the changes made to our audio-visual system within the sanctuary.

During the week beginning 5th August work is expected to start on updating the equipment we use to show you the words of the hymns, videos and illustrations to accompany Stuart's sermons.

Ever since lockdown happened, way back in March 2020, churches throughout the UK had to adapt to a new way of keeping in touch with their congregations. Through the joint efforts of our previous minister, Fiona, and her husband, Andrew, we had livestreaming of services from the manse and then from the church. This meant putting together an array of equipment to enable this to take place.

It has meant that we have a mix of different monitors, laptops, adaptors and cabling to contend with. We did have a digital projector, but despite trying all the various settings we could never show on the screen the clear, colourful slides as they appeared on the laptops and monitors in the gallery.

You may recall us experimenting with switching off and on the two spotlights that shine down on the chancel area, to try and give the congregation a clearer picture on the screen. We also took out the background photos and tried various fonts and colours to make the words of the hymns easier to read.

Eventually we were able to make use of another projector, originally belonging to the Church of Scotland HQ in Edinburgh, but it too makes showing of some illustrations/photos difficult, even with the screen put in place by our wonderful Property Team it is still problematic. If you sit close enough in the front pews of the sanctuary and look up at the small monitor to our organist's left you get an idea of what should be on the screen. If the motorised screen is just kept as a standby piece of equipment it means that the choir will be able to have their previous seating arrangements.

The new equipment will include a large monitor screen above the door used by our choir when they enter the sanctuary, with another above the door next to the pulpit. They will be slightly angled inwards. A third monitor will be hung where the 'girl with the kite' wall hanging is situated on the back wall of the main section of the seating in

the sanctuary. This third monitor will enable the Minister and choir to see what is being shown to the congregation and to those watching the service online.

Up until now the livestreaming has involved controlling the camera (situated above the wall hanging) from controls on a monitor, the livestreaming software from a MacBook and sound from a 'little black box' with the PowerPoint presentation from a Windows laptop! It can be operated by one person – with difficulty – as sometimes two or three things have to be changed almost simultaneously.

The new system should make things easier for everyone, and will do away with the need to move the current projector every time there is a funeral, wedding, visiting choir concerts etc. It will also mean that our Minister can advance the slides illustrating points in his sermon.

Please bear with us as we get to grips with the new equipment, and let us know what you think of this new system.

There have been a number of occasions recently when none of the team were available to use the system during a funeral, and we are indebted to David Bain who was able to look after the sound in relation to the Minister's headset microphone and the lectern.

We would encourage anyone, of any age, who would like to assist us in this work to contact myself, Katia McFarlane or Gordon Leitch, as we really need to increase the number of people who can use this equipment.

Firmly Planted: Agroforestry for Sustainability

The Stamp Appeal is an easy way for congregations to get involved in the world mission work of the church.

"Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up." (Galatians 6:9)

Firmly Planted is a community-based agroforestry initiative with the ambition of making a sustainable impact across Malawi, Zambia and Zimbabwe. It is spearheaded by our partners in the Church of Central Africa Presbyterian (CCAP), and built around the church's community structures. The initiative will resource individual groups to respond to the various challenges affecting Malawi today.

Agroforestry presents an opportunity to address challenges of food insecurity, deforestation, climate change and youth unemployment. Tree nurseries create employment opportunities, fruit trees improve nutrition and wider tree planting helps mitigate the impact of the climate crisis, in turn improving agricultural productivity.

Firmly Planted will provide community-based training tailored to the community's needs, ensuring woodlots are well maintained to have the greatest chance to thrive. The programme, through effective distribution, looks to attain large-scale tree planting of locally relevant woodlots - these could be linked to schools, churches, clinics and community groups. Having already established a pilot tree nursery, CCAP is looking to replicate this across the Synods by implementing Central Tree Nursery Hubs allowing each nursery to grow tree seedlings based on the needs of their communities.

Our mission partner, Gary Brough, is one of the project coordinators and is looking for opportunities to grow the project. You can keep up to date with Gary's work on the Church of Scotland Mission Partner page of the website. The Guild is also involved in supporting this programme. This year stamp appeal proceeds will go towards establishing the tree nurseries.

Please continue to collect your used stamps and put them in the green container in the vestibule. They will be trimmed and sent on, and once the project closes the amount raised will be put into the Order of Service and the Newsletter. Thank you very much for supporting such a valuable project.

Marty MacBean

Recipient of Youthlink Scotland Lifetime Achievement Award

Marty was nominated by Highland Girls' Brigade for the Youthlink Scotland Lifetime Achievement Award for her service to Girls' Brigade over 70 years and she received this very well deserved award in Glasgow recently.



Marty joined 4th Inverness Company of Girls' Guildry when she was 7 and said she was very fortunate to have received so much kindness, guidance and training from Guildry officers in Ness Bank. These leaders encouraged Marty to become a leader and in 1964 she became an officer.

At that time a second company was formed: the 4th Inverness became 4A and the second company was 4B, and Marty was appointed Captain. It started in Green Drive Hall and then moved to Cauldeen School, and to this day she continues to be an officer in 4B Company.

Over the years Marty received her Duke of Edinburgh Gold Award and the Queen's Award which is the highest award a girl may gain. In 2017 she received the British Empire Medal for services to GB.

From 1962 until 1964 she was involved in the Crèche, then became a Sunday School teacher and to this day is still involved in Sunday School.

The citation from Youthlink stated:

It is suggested that this prayer diary should be used as an additional resource for private daily prayers. The prayer points can be used as you choose each day. Give thanks for each topic as you pray and bring the needs of every situation before God.

Week beginning Sunday 18 August

- Loving God, we give thanks for our Minister, Stuart Smith, and ask Your blessing on him as he preaches Your word to the congregation and to those on the livestream. We pray that Stuart and Elspeth will enjoy their new life in Inverness.
- Lord, we give thanks for Professor Bill McBryde and Rev Penelope Smirthwaite who led worship during the period of vacancy and Rev Ian Manson who carried out the duties of Interim Moderator.
- Father, we ask Your blessing on the Session Clerk and the Kirk Session, and give thanks for their dedication and commitment to Ness Bank and to the members in their districts.
- The high cost of living continues to be a great worry for so many people. Lord, as we approach autumn and winter we pray that those who struggle to pay for fuel and food will be assisted by the various agencies and charities.

- Almighty God, the conflict in Israel and Gaza continues to be fierce and our hearts go out to those who have lost family and friends and those who have been injured. We pray earnestly Lord for peace in this region. Dr Moira Lang is a Palliative Care Specialist who spends time in Gaza training doctors and her eye-witness account sheds light on the dire healthcare situation in Gaza, revealing a lack of pain medication, inadequate resources, and critical health conditions faced by patients.

- Lord, the NHS continues to have very long waiting lists for appointments and treatment. We pray for the staff who have to cope with the stress of these demands, both in hospitals and in the community.
- Father, we give thanks for the church administrator, church officer and cleaner who provide great support to the congregation.

 Clèir Eilean ì - Presbytery of the Highlands and the Hebrides - will meet in Fort William this week and we pray Lord that this meeting will be constructive with good decision-making.

Week beginning Sunday 15 September

- CrossReach is the social care arm of the Church of Scotland and provides many services throughout Scotland. Within our area we give thanks for the residents, staff and volunteers in Whinnieknowe in Nairn, Oversteps in Dornoch, Cameron House, Cale House and Beechwood House all in Inverness. We pray for the Counselling Service in Inverness which provides support to young people and adults.
- Migrants seeking asylum in the United Kingdom continue to arrive in small boats and unfortunately many have lost their lives during the dangerous crossing in the channel. Lord, we pray that our government will find a way to resolve this problem which is so complex but also urgent.
- Lord, we give thanks for the many chaplains involved in hospitals, hospices, workplaces, the armed forces and in charities.
- The ladies of Ness Bank Crafties continue to meet every Tuesday morning for a time of fellowship. Father, we give thanks for their skill in creating such wonderful articles which are sold for church funds.
- God, we give thanks for the mental health services and charities. The demand for help for those suffering from mental health issues continues to rise and this in turn has increased the waiting list in mental health hospitals. We give thanks for the CPNs who give support to those in the community.

Week beginning Sunday 22 September

- We give thanks God for the Guild, both nationally and locally, and ask Your blessing on the members of the Guild in Ness Bank. We pray that members are looking forward to the new session and we give thanks for those who have arranged the new syllabus. We give thanks too for the Work Party who continue to provide many garments for local hospitals and charities.

- Loving God, we pray for those people who have physical disabilities and who are unable to work. We pray that the welfare system will ensure that they have housing, food and enough money to pay their bills.
- God, we pray for those members and friends who are housebound and unable to come to church. We give thanks for the livestream service which enables them to watch Sunday worship and we ask Your blessing on the volunteers who are involved in this service.
- Gracious Father, we are grateful that volunteers from Ness Bank lead a time of worship in Ach an Eas once a month. We pray for all the staff who provide such wonderful care to those unable to stay in their own homes.
- We pray for those living with Dementia or Alzheimer's Disease. Due to a lack of beds in care homes many require to be cared for at home by relatives and home carers. We ask Your blessing on all care staff who provide a valuable service to those unable to look after themselves.


Week beginning Sunday 29 September

- Within the parish of Ness Bank is the Bught Cosy Cafè and on Mondays at lunchtime volunteers from the community and from Ness Bank provide a warm space for the folks in the area. Tea, coffee, soup and scones is available and we ask Your blessing on this facility which enables friendships to be formed which in turn eases loneliness.
- The conflict between Ukraine and Russia continues to cause so much heartache for the residents of Ukraine. Lord, we think of those Ukrainians who have come to Scotland seeking peace and asylum until they can return home. Our prayer today is for peace and for the war to end.
- Lord, the prison service is under extreme pressure and many prisons are full. As a result prisoners are being released earlier than planned so that more accommodation can be made available. We ask Your blessing on the rehabilitation programme taking place in prisons which is designed to help prisoners integrate into communities after release.

- Lord, let us pray every day for all the many blessings we receive from You and we ask that you will give us the strength to follow your footsteps all the days of our lives.
- Lord, we ask Your blessing on the emergency services who provide essential support to the communities in the Highland Area and throughout Scotland. We give thanks for their dedication and skill.

World Mission Prayer Topics:

- This summer, at Scripture Union Camps and SU/Church local Missions, thousands of children will hear that God loves them and cares deeply for them. We pray for the staff and volunteers who give the Bible teaching, who organise the games and activities, who cook the meals, and we ask that the Holy Spirit will help the children to understand God's love.
- The Church of Scotland has two Mission Partner ministers in Israel/Palestine, supporting the small congregations in Jerusalem and Tiberias, as well as the chaplaincy of Tabeetha School and of the Scots Hotel and St. Andrew's Guest House. They ask for our prayers for this "strategic ministry" in the current difficult situation where reliable reports note that 3,600 Palestinians are currently held, without charge, in Israeli jails.
- Tearfund reports that "The Rubbish Campaign" is thriving in Latin America thanks to a movement of young Christians passionate about the ending of plastic pollution. In Bolivia and Columbia, for example, they have been raising their concerns with government and UN staff. They are promoting the creation of green jobs through waste management and recycling, and increasing the use of organic fertilisers in these countries so vulnerable to climate change. We give thanks for their courage and enthusiasm, asking for Your blessing on their efforts to bring about change.
- In the Great Lakes region of Africa, listeners can hear Gospel messages and health advice, in their local languages. These are broadcast by Radio Ivyizigiro, which is supported by Blythswood Care. We pray that these programmes will change lives, both physically and spiritually.
